NOTE FROM OUR *Board President*

Dear Friends,

My first introduction to CASA happened over lunch in 2016. It was the annual Light of Hope luncheon, to be exact. Over the course of that one hour, it became crystal clear that this was work I needed to get behind immediately. Although my work schedule wasn't compatible with becoming an advocate, there were, and still are, other ways to make an impact – and so I did. The rest, as they say, is history.

At CASA of Northwest Arkansas, we believe in the power of one. One person who steps in during a dark moment. One person who shows up, listens, advocates, and refuses to let a child slip through the cracks. One person who says, "You matter."

This year's Impact Report is filled with numbers, milestones, and outcomes we're incredibly proud of. In it you'll read about young adults who are stepping into independence, and the hard work of reunification. You'll meet brave and beautiful young people, and families finding their way back together.

For every story you'll read in this report there are countless more, stories as varied as the people in them. But they all have one thing in common – in every story is someone who has helped along the way.

Someone like:

- **Tom**, who coordinated with a CASA program outside of NWA to get bunk beds delivered to his CASA kids' new home. These bunkbeds allowed his CASA kids to move in with their family immediately, rather than having to wait.
- **Glen**, who takes Samuel* fishing every chance they get.
- **Mallory**, who drove five and a half hours one way to purchase the perfect shoes to match Natalie's* prom dress.
- **Happy**, who has celebrated with Chance* on his birthday every year since 2017, usually with a pizza and chocolate cake.
- **Blair**, who stepped down from her position on the board when her former CASA youth Carley* re-entered foster care, ensuring Carley had someone familiar and stable to rely on.

THE ONE WHO *Never Let Go*

In a system defined by inconsistency and loss, a CASA volunteer is often the **ONE** person a child can count on. For Cale, who lived in 11 different placements during their two years in foster care, their CASA Daphne was that steady thread, someone who could be relied on during good times and hard times.

Daphne was there when Cale learned that they'd be moving to yet another home. "They were angry... they cussed and cried," Daphne remembers. "To be able to be the one to just sit with them in that, staying steady and reassuring that I would follow them, but letting them 'feel' and express the devastation... That moment will stick with me."

During what can be one of the scariest parts of foster care—moving to a new placement—Daphne made it a point to be there for Cale in person. "I got to be the one face the kiddo knew" Daphne shares. "I got to do introductions and got to see their room and stayed for a bit to settle them into the new space."

And Daphne got to celebrate triumphs too! Daphne's fierce and relentless advocacy was vital in achieving permanence for Cale, as she located and made contact with a family member from out of state. Eventually Daphne got to witness a powerful reunion between Cale and their family, recalling "They had not seen each other several years... I was there to 'bridge an awkward gap'. Being there was a comfort to all parties."

Today, Cale is living with this family member and they are connected, supported, and accepted, and Daphne was there through every step.

For Daphne, showing up week after week didn't just support Cale—it changed her, too. "They taught me not to be cynical. They reminded me how valuable it is to stay hopeful."

One person. One presence. One fierce advocate who simply never gave up. For Cale, Daphne was the one who was always there.

"THEIR LIVES—AND THE CHANCE TO WALK ALONGSIDE THEM—REINFORCED FOR ME THAT DOING GOOD MATTERS, EVEN WHEN IT'S HARD, EVEN WHEN IT FEELS UNNOTICED. ESPECIALLY THEN."



THE **ONE** CONNECTION THAT *Changes Everything*

All kids deserve connection, belonging, and a sense of family identity. But for many young people in foster care, those bonds are fractured or even completely lost. Removed from their homes and communities, teens may spend years in foster care without any ties to biological family, without permanent placements, and with no one to call their own when they age out at 18 or 21.

CASA of Northwest Arkansas is working to change that through our Reconnecting Roots program. With support from DHS, attorneys ad litem, and family court judges, we're helping youth in foster care uncover their family histories and identify potential lifelong connections. Using genealogy databases like Ancestry.com and FamilySearch, as well as DNA matching, our hope is to build family trees that can open doors, sometimes even leading to reunification or adoption by previously unknown relatives.

This work is about more than just names on a chart. It's about identity. It's about healing. It's about helping a young person discover where they've come from, and who they still belong to.

Teens in foster care are asked to grow up fast and far too often, they do it alone. The transition to adulthood is daunting for any teenager. For youth without stable, supportive relationships, it can be devastating. The risks of homelessness, unemployment, and exploitation rise sharply.

These young people deserve better. With targeted advocacy and programs like Reconnecting Roots, we can be the steady, reliable presence they need and the voice that says: you matter, and you're not alone.

THE ONE IN THE Room

Meredith had only known Isabella, her CASA youth, for a few months when she was invited to witness one of the most powerful moments of Isabella's life: the birth of her precious son. After 22 hours of labor, this young mom brought her sweet baby into the world with stunning grace—thanking nurses, showing kindness through pain, and stepping bravely into motherhood.

Meredith recalls "When I was driving to the hospital, I was musing about how special it is to be invited into that big of a moment in a person's life. We had only known each other for a few months at the time, and we are not related. Those big moments are often reserved for family. I was genuinely honored to be able to stand in and support her for family and friends not able to be in the room that day."

Meredith was honored to be one among the small crowd Isabella could rely on when her family couldn't be there. Isabella's foster parents were present, and thanks to a joint effort between Meredith and CASA staff, Isabella had the support of a Spanish-speaking doula as well. Her doula was incredible, guiding her through delivery, ensuring Isabella's post-delivery meals included foods she liked, and offering postpartum and lactation support. And many folks rallied to throw Isabella a baby shower, making sure this chapter in Isabelle's life began wrapped in love, excitement, and dignity. "Community showed up in just the way it should to show that we are all in this together," shares Meredith.

From Isabella, Meredith has learned what real courage looks like. She explains "I have learned from [Isabella] that courage can be demonstrated

even when you feel afraid. Courage, determination in the face of adversity, resilience and intentionally taking the time to connect with other people are beautiful!" As a CASA volunteer, Meredith stepped in to be one who would change Isabella's story, and in doing so, Meredith's own story changed too.

THE ONE WHO Gives

When I was younger, I went through a traumatic experience, but one person stood by me. They were a constant in world that suddenly became very unstable. They explained what was happening, advocated for me, and made sure I didn't feel invisible. Years later, I realize that person served in a role much like a CASA. That realization never left me. Supporting CASA is now my way of being that steady presence for a child who didn't ask to be placed in such a frightening situation. Every child deserves to feel seen, heard, and supported, especially in the moments that matter most.

As a family, we've faced our own challenges, and we know well the difference the kind of support CASA provides can make. Our hope is that giving in this way will help lessen the trauma children experience during a confusing and painful time in their lives. Childhood trauma can have lasting effects—but with grace, mentorship, and compassionate advocacy, those effects can be softened. I want each child to know: **You are not alone. You are supported. You are capable of healing and moving forward.**

My family gives to CASA in several ways, including direct giving and through a Donor-Advised Fund (DAF). A DAF is a powerful tool for long-term impact. Not only does it offer valuable tax benefits that align with our family's financial strategy, but it allows the fund to grow, amplifying the benefit to CASA over time. It's one of the ways we ensure our giving is intentional and sustainable.








COUNTY OF ORIGIN









THE ONES WHO KEEP *Showing Up*

Since 2020, Ann and David have supported 16 children representing 5 families involved with the foster care system. As veteran volunteers, they recognize that every case, every family, every child is a story all its own with moments that will be remembered long after the case is closed.

In late 2024 Ann and David agreed to take on a new case involving four young children. This case was different than ones they'd served before and required them to navigate spaces they hadn't previously, like culture and language differences, tricky criminal proceedings, and the fact that they were entering in the middle of a case rather than the beginning. But Ann and David were up for the challenge, jumping in to support the kids, their parents, and their extended family as well.

The case recently closed, and Ann and David reflected on some of the big moments throughout it. "I was able to view a recording of the children seeing their father in supervised visitation for the first time since they came into care" Ann shares. "It had been over 6 months since they had seen him. The video was very moving, and I'll not forget seeing this reunion."

Moments like that are at the heart CASA's work, as we recognize two things: children fare far better when they can be safely reunified with their families and the work of reunification isn't easy. "The parents who acknowledge that they've messed up and genuinely want to change that are most likely to end up with reunification" explains Ann. "We have learned empathy for them because most of the people we have worked with are doing the best they can with what they have or where they are."

Ann and David's consistency, warmth, and emphasis on supporting their CASA kids and their parents were instrumental to this successful case closure. As they advocated for educational support, financial assistance, and access to community resources, Ann and David helped break down barriers and paved the way for a family to heal, rebuild, and reunite.

Showing up. Watching reunions. Encouraging parents. Uplifting children. Ann and David did it all, quietly and consistently—because one caring adult really can change everything.

THE ONES FOR Casey

In 2005, Casey* and her three brothers were placed in foster care. These four young kids, already impacted by abuse and neglect, would spend the following years facing further hurt, loss, and instability in a system that simply isn't capable of supporting kids to thrive.

Today, Casey is a young adult, dipping her toes into independence, and she's been able to rebuild family connections that once seemed to be forever severed.

After spending over 11 years in foster care, Casey had every reason to give up on the system. She's been through placement after placement. She had hopes of permanent homes dashed, as it became clear that prospective adoptive families were not a good fit for her. She's carried with her the loss of family members and siblings. Anyone who has been through the things Casey has would feel left behind, misunderstood, invisible. Anyone in that position would fiercely try to hold out hope for someone who would show up and stay.

For Casey, that someone turned out to be two someones: Shannon and Kara.

Over the last 11 years they have been her constants. Whether through midnight phone calls, weekly Zoom meetings, or long road trips to see her in person, Shannon and Kara showed up for Casey, every time. When Casey once again had to move to a new home, they didn't wait to be asked - they drove hours to retrieve her belongings from a difficult former foster parent, and then carefully washed, stored, or shipped them, piece by piece. When Casey needed her glasses replaced after a year without them, they made sure she got to her eye appointment. When she needed her braces removed, they made it happen. When she needed to feel celebrated, they planned

an entire birthday party, complete with travel, hair appointments, and cake. They made sure she got to celebrate her 17th birthday with a real party, real love, and real dignity.

They're on every call, in every staffing, always thinking about her as a whole human – not just where she is living at the time, but how she's healing, who she's becoming, and how they can support her to continue to grow. Together, they helped reconnect Casey with her brother, pushing through red tape to get sibling contact approved, coordinated, and ensure it was emotionally safe for her.

Shannon and Kara aren't just volunteers.
